TEACHING TIME

SCRIPTURE | Exodus 20:12-14

- We're on the road for the third week of our pretend road trip! Along the way, we're hearing more and more about the Ten Commandments or rules God wants us to live by.
- These are the first four we talked about so far let's review them together:
 - Put God first.
 - No idols. Worship God only.
 - Respect God's name.
 - Worship and rest on God's day.
- Next up, we have commandments five, six, and seven. Each of these commandments are about loving people, especially our families.
- INSTRUCTIONS: Read Exodus 20:12-14 aloud from a preschool-friendly Bible.
- We can show our love to our parents and other grownups who take care of us by listening to them and treating them with love and kindness. They want to keep us safe, so obeying them is what's best for us!

- We can show our love to our siblings and other family members by being kind to them.
 We all get frustrated and angry sometimes, but we should not do or say things that will intentionally hurt them.
- We can also show love to people we make promises to like when people get married.
